



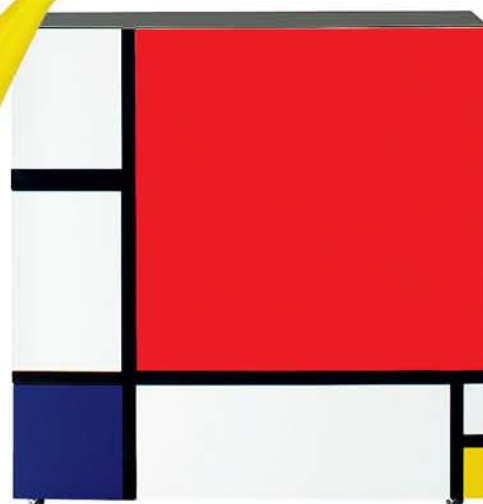

## AFTER MONDRIAN

Colour blocking continues to shape the catwalks with designers such as Blugirl (left) and Prada paying homage to the Dutch godfather of the primary palette. The geometric compositions of De Stijl artist Piet Mondrian are bringing harmony to homeware, too. Square up with Kayiwa's Nzela table or eschew art for a Magscapes magnetic statement wall, based on Mondrian's 'lozenge' paintings. Giulio Cappellini, who recently reissued Shiro Kuramata's Homage to Mondrian cabinet, explains the appeal. 'Much loved in the Sixties and Seventies, primary colours are back. In a neutral interior, you only need one piece – design objects by their strength alone can almost become the symbol of artistic presence.' So stick on some jazz and compose yourself.
